Explanation: The Department was able to acquire a Military 5 Ton Truck through the U.S. Government. This vehicle came at no cost and would be valued at \$150,000 new if bought commercially. The Fire Department will be seeking bids for the fabrication of all associated "Bar" work and a complete firefighting platform for the rear of the vehicle, which includes all fabricating, purchase and installation of a water/foam tank, fire pump and all associated accessories. Once this truck is complete, it will replace a 1977 Brush Breaker that was slated for replacement in 2014 costing over \$450,000.00 today.

Article 17: Tank Maintenance Plan (REQUIRES 2/3 VOTE)

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds for a 15-year distribution tank maintenance program (with one optional 5year renewal) or to act anything thereon, or thereunto. The cost schedule for the program is provided in the explanation of the warrant article request.

Explanation: The Water Department owns and operates three distribution tanks: Bourne Hill, Glen Charlie, and West Wareham Tank. These tanks provide the necessary fire protection and water pressure required to run safe and sanitary distribution system. The Bourne Hill tank interior paint coating has failed, and the West Wareham tank exterior coating is in its final year before failure (failure defined as paint no longer protecting the base steel and the tank is actively corroding). As such it is becoming a struggle to maintain sanitary conditions at these tanks. Preparing the tank for repainting, welding the corrosion pits, and painting the interior and exterior of each standpipe is estimated to range from \$700,000 to \$1.4M per tank. In light of the cost for painting the standpipes, the Board of Water Commissioners (BoWC) explored replacing the Bourne Hill tank and West Wareham tank with elevated standpipes. The cost for demolishing these tanks and erecting new tanks is estimated to range from \$5.5M to \$6.0M. A third option which was explored by the BoWC and presented here is to bid out the tank maintenance as a managed plan by a private entity. The program would contain the following services:

- 1. Full rehabilitation of the Bourne Hill tank and West Wareham tank (interior and exterior).
- 2. Washout and clean interior of all tanks every 5 years.
- 3. Touch up painting systems at the Bourne Hill tank and West

Continued: Wareham tank annually for the exterior, and every five years during the washout and cleaning of the tank.

- a. Tank exterior would be fully painted again, as determined per the coatings inspection process in approximately 8-10 years after the initial rehabilitation to extend coating system life.
- 4. Annual inspection as required by the MassDEP for all tanks.
- 5. Modify the Glen Charlie safety ladder to come into OSHA code compliance.
- 6. Wash and seal the concrete pedestal for the Glen Charlie Tank.
- 7. Add a cathodic protection system to the Bourne Hill and West Wareham tank.
- 8. Replace the passive cathodic protection system for the Glen Charlie tank every 3 to 5 years.
- 9. Paint system warranted for the full period of the contract, compared to a hired contractor with 1-year warrantee.

This option has the benefit of leveraging a third party's funding and spreading out the cost so that impact on the operation budget is lessened. This type of maintenance can also save the future cost of a full rehab and extend life of tanks.

The proposed cost for the tank maintenance plan is provided below.

The funds for this project would be taken from surplus and added to the annual operational budget.

The program allows for early exit of the contract each year. However, if major projects have been implemented in prior years, such as tank painting, those cost have been spread out over a 2 to 3-year time period. Those costs would be due payable within 60 to 90 days after the contract is cancelled. The contract has a renewal period once a year.

Article 18: Power Line Updates and Conversion

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$115,000 for the purposes of updating the District owned power distribution grid in the wellfield (Maple Spring and/or Seawood Springs) and converting the private lines at Maples Springs to Eversource; or to act anything thereon, or thereunto.

Explanation: Eversource is requiring that the District owned power distribution grid be upgraded to provide reliable power to the Maple Springs Wellfield. As part of this process, the District would like to transfer ownership of the powerlines to Eversource. In the near future, the District will be moving to take similar steps of District owned power lines on the Seawood Springs wellfield as well. Any remaining funds from the Maple Spring update and conversion will be used to initiate the Seawood Springs conversion.

Article 19: Backhoe Replacement

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$130,000 for the purposes of purchasing a new backhoe; or to act anything thereon, or thereunto.

The Water Department owns a 1992 backhoe. The cost for Explanation: maintaining the backhoe has become significant. As such this backhoe has been relegated to yard-use at 2550 Cranberry Highway due to reliability and safety issues. This purchase would replace the 1992 backhoe.

Article 20: Wellfield Radio Backup to the Supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA)

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$15,000 for the purposes of providing a redundant communication source to server located at the wellfield; including all costs incidental and related thereto or to act thereon, or thereunto.

<u>Explanation</u>: The current communication out to the wellfield is provided through a private provider, Comcast. This connection has been notorious for not being a reliable connection. When a communication connection is lost and the system can no longer be run in automatic mode remotely, we are required by the state to have an operator run the system by hand or to oversee the process automatic mode locally with an operator at the wellfield terminal. This alternative communication will provide the necessary redundancy required by MassDEP.

<u>Explanation</u>: The District owns a 1996 Chevy pickup. This vehicle was recently taken out of the fleet as it would not pass inspection. The Water Department is looking to replace this pickup with GMC Acadia or similar, or a hybrid vehicle.

Article 22: Billing Software Work Order Module Addition

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$45,000 for the purposes of adding a work order module to the billing software including all costs incidental and related thereto, or to act thereon, or thereunto.

<u>Explanation</u>: The Water Department currently performs all work orders manually, records inventory manually, and keeps paper copies of all activities associated with this process. The District is looking to leverage technology to better track the level of effort

to perform the work, track services completed, track inventory, and improve the level of service to the District.

Article 25: Equipment Trailer and Crew Cab Updates

<u>Explanation</u>: This purchase would increase efficiency at major construction projects. By having all tools available reduces trips back to the office as well as number of vehicles required at a job site.

Article 24. Chlorine Disinfection Pipe (REQUIRES 2/3 VOTE)

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow, or transfer from available funds the sum of \$500,000 for the purposes of constructing a disinfection pipe at the Water Purification Plant that would provide the necessary residence time for chlorine disinfection including all costs incidental and related thereto, and to fund this amount by utilizing \$500,000 of the principal forgiveness awarded to the District by the Clean Water Trust, or to act thereon or thereunto

Explanation: The Maple Springs wellfield is headed to fall under the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection's Ground Water Rule (GWR) and well as Revised Total Coliform Rule (RTCR). This rule set requires disinfection for viruses. In 2007 and 2008 when the Water Department was not required to add chlorine, the Water Department had two major boil water events associated with the RTCR. This had a major impact on the businesses in Town as well as undermined consumer confidence in the water quality. The disinfection pipe will allow the controlled use of chlorine to meet this regulation.

The District received a \$14M low interest loan from SRF for the construction of

the Water Purification Plant. As part of the SRF Loan program the District received principal forgiveness in the amount of \$653,904.00. A 2/3 Vote of the District is required to authorize the use of any portion of the principal forgiveness.

Explanation: The West Wareham tank access road has reached the end of its useful life and requires replacement

Article 26: Air Release Valve Replacement

To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds the sum of \$21,000.00 for the purpose of replacing existing air release valves and associated isolation valves, including the payment of all costs incidental and related thereto, or to act thereon or thereunto.

Explanation: The District has several locations where air release valves are placed in the distribution system to release air at high points. Many are shut off as they are no longer functional. Large amounts of air can cause a temporary restriction in the water main and lessens the pressure and flow through the water main.
